
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1. Introduction

The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021 (hereinafter referred to as the 'Act') governs the functioning of the Commission. The Commission has been constituted with Members from the State Governments of Haryana, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, NCT of Delhi and other Central Ministries, Organizations, NGOs and independent Technical Members, amongst others. The Commission is assisted by various statutory Sub-Committees working in specific areas and issues related to abatement of air pollution in the NCR.

Apart from the NCT of Delhi, the jurisdiction of the Commission extends to the 27 districts of Haryana, UP and Rajasthan falling in the NCR, as depicted in the map below and also to the adjoining areas for activities which have bearing on the overall Air Quality in the NCR.

2. Constitution of the Commission

In exercise of the powers conferred by Sub-Section (1), (2) and (3) of Section 3 of the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021, the Central Government constituted the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas, comprising of the following Members:

- (a) a full-time Chairperson;
- (b) a representative of the Secretary, MoEF&CC, not below the rank of Joint Secretary, exofficio;
- (c) five ex officio Members either Chief Secretaries, or Secretaries incharge of the Department dealing with environment protection in the NCT of Delhi and the States of Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh;
- (d) one full-time Member who is or has been a Joint Secretary to the Government of India;
- (e) three full-time independent technical Members having specific knowledge and experience in matters relating to air pollution;
- (f) one technical Member from the Central Pollution Control Board, ex officio;
- (g) one technical Member to be nominated by the Indian Space Research Organisation, exofficio;
- (h) three Members from NGOs having experience in matters concerning combating of air pollution;
- (i) one representative of the National Institution for Transforming India, not below the rank of Joint Secretary or Adviser, ex officio;
- (j) one officer in the rank of Joint Secretary to the Government of India as a full-time Member-Secretary of the Commission;
- (k) Three members, from such sectors as agriculture, industry, transport or construction.

Sub-Section (3) of Section 3 of the Act provides that the Commission may co-opt the persons as Associate Members which includes Commission for Air Quality Management



a representative from each of the MoRTH, MoP, MoHUA, MoPNG, MoAFW, MoC&I, not below the rank of Joint Secretary to the Government of India, a representative from any association of commerce or industry and such other Member(s) as may be prescribed.

Rules notified under the CAQMAct

In exercise of the powers conferred under the Act, the Ministry of Environment, Forests & Climate Change have notified the following Rules:

- a) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Appointment, Salary, Allowances and other Terms & Conditions of service of Chairperson, Full-time Members and Member Secretary) Rules, 2021, on 27th August, 2021, as amended on 25th October, 2021 and 21st February, 2023.
- b) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Manner of Taking Samples and Form of Notice) Rules, 2021, on 13th October, 2021.
- c) The Commission for Air Quality Management in the National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Form of Annual Statement of Accounts) Rules, 2022, on 4th May, 2022.
- d) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (salaries, allowances and conditions of service of the officers and staff of the Commission) Rules, 2022, on 11th July, 2022 as amended on 6th October, 2022.
- e) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Manner of Removal of Chairperson or member other than ex-Officio Member) Rules, 2023, on 21st February, 2023.
- f) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (other Associated Members of the Commission) Rules, 2023, on 21st February, 2023.
- g) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Allowance payable to Member, other than ex-Officio Member of the Sub-Committees) Rules, 2023, on 21st



February, 2023.

 h) The Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Imposition, Collection and Utilization of Environmental Compensation for Stubble Burning) Rules, 2023, on 28.04.2023.

Regulations notified by the Commission

In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (2) of section 26 read with sub-sections (2) and (4) of section 10 of the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021, the Commission, with the previous approval of the Central Government, notified the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Conduct of Business and Conditions and Limitations in Delegation of Powers of Commission) Regulations, 2021 on 17th September, 2021 and the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas, (Form and Manner of Furnishing Annual Report) Regulations, 2022, on 12th May, 2022.

Delegation of the powers of the Commission

The Commission, in exercise of powers conferred under Sub-Section (4) of Section 10 of the Act, issued an Order dated 07th October, 2021, stipulating the Schedule of Delegation of powers of the Commission, to be exercised by the full Commission, Chairperson, Full Time Member, Member Secretary or the Sub-Committees etc.

Delegation of Financial Powers

With the approval of the Commission, a schedule of delegation of Financial Powers vested with the Commission was also issued, broadly in line with the GFR and DFPR of the Govt. of India, vide orders of the Commission dated 25th June, 2021 and 16th May, 2024 respectively.



3. Constitution of the Sub Committees of the Commission

Section 11 of the Act mandates the following three Sub-Committees:

(a) Sub-Committee on Monitoring and Identification

The Sub-Committee on Monitoring and Identification was first constituted by the Commission, vide Order dated 17th May, 2021, comprising of 08 Members, as per the mandate of the Act and as amended from time to time.

(b) Sub-Committee on Safeguarding and Enforcement

The Sub-Committee on Safeguarding and Enforcement was also constituted by the Commission, vide Order dated 17th May, 2021 under the chairmanship of the Chairperson of the Commission, comprising of 15 other Members, as per the mandate of the Act and as amended from time to time.

(c) Sub-Committee on Research and Development

The Sub-Committee on Research and Development was constituted by the Commission, vide Order dated 17th May, 2021, chaired by a fulltime technical Member of the Commission, comprising of 09 other Members, as per the mandate of the Act and as amended from time to time.

Sub-Committee for Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP)

In wake of high air pollution levels in Delhi-NCR generally encountered during the winter season owing to unfavorable climatic and meteorological conditions, the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) was notified by the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change in January, 2017, as an emergency response action plan to prevent further deterioration of air quality, once the pollutant concentration reached a certain threshold.

Under the provisions of the Act, a Sub-Committee was constituted by the Commission on 7th October, 2021, comprising of members from CPCB, DPCC, HSPCB, RSPCB, UPPCB and the CAQM for invoking actions and reviewing the status of implementation of various measures under the GRAP. The Sub-Committee has been subsequently re-constituted from time to time.



4. Mandate, Goals and Objectives of the Commission

The Commission has been set up under the provisions of the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021, for better co-ordination, research, identification and resolution of problems surrounding the air quality index and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

The Commission is empowered to take all such measures, as it deems necessary or expedient for protecting and improving the quality of air in the National Capital Region and adjoining areas.

In line with its objectives, the Commission, since its inception has involved various stakeholders for collaborative and coordinated actions by the Governments of the NCT of Delhi and the States of Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, to enforce the objectives of this Act and planning and execution of programmes in the region for prevention, control and abatement of air pollution. A common "Air-Shed" approach across state boundaries has been emphasized to be adopted to mitigate air pollution in the National Capital Region.

The Commission is also empowered to lay down parameters for the quality of air, for emission or discharge of environmental pollutants from various sources and to consider restriction in areas in which any industry or class of industries, operations or processes that have implications on air quality in the region.

The Commission from time to time, issued Statutory Directions under the provisions of Section 12 of the Act to regulate, control and prohibit activities that impact the quality of air in the NCR and adjoining areas and also laid down parameters for the discharge of air pollutants. Additionally, Advisories have been issued to convey the seriousness of different air pollution related issues and provide guidance for effective actions to mitigate the same, besides orders to streamline the field level compliance of the envisaged air pollution control measures.

The Commission also engaged with eminent scientific/technical/ research-based institutions and has undertaken projects/activities towards investigations into and research on air pollution related aspects.

Towards effective enforcement and safeguarding measures, the Commission also carried out extensive inspections of industrial premises, construction & demolition sites, roads and open areas for effective implementation and enforcement of provisions under various environmental acts, rules/regulations, statutory directions, policy guidelines etc. relating to prevention, control and abatement of air pollution, including deterrent measures like levying of EC charges on the erring entities through the respective Pollution Control Boards/Committee, besides prosecution action under the provisions of the Act.

5. The Year in Retrospect

Since its inception, the Commission has been rigorously taking up the issue of air pollution in NCR and adjoining areas and has identified various sectors contributing to air pollution with core focus Industrial Pollution, Pollution from Diesel Generator (DG) sets, Vehicles and Transport sector, Agricultural Stubble Burning, Municipal Solid Waste/Biomass Burning, Fires in Sanitary Landfills sites, Dust from Construction and Demolition Project activities, Road and Open Areas dust and pollution from dispersed sources etc.

The Commission has been continually and closely studying the Air Quality parameters and associated meteorological conditions and necessary directions / orders are being issued by the Commission from time to time taking due cognizance of the prevailing adverse climatic and meteorological conditions advised and projections by IMD.

The Commission held four (4) meetings of the members, where important statutory Directions and Advisories were approved. Such Directions and Advisories were thereafter issued to various implementing and enforcement agencies / entities to initiate appropriate actions for prevention, control and mitigation of air pollution from various contributory sectors and related activities. Besides, 70 Statutory Committees meetings (including Sub-Committee for GRAP) and 166 other Sectoral meetings were held to monitor and review the actions taken towards abatement of air pollution.

To guide and direct various actions towards abatement of air pollution in the region, the Commission in the year 2023-2024 has issued 7 Statutory Directions, 6 Advisories (as listed in **Annexure-I**) and various executive orders to Govt. of NCR States/GNCTD and various agencies concerned in the region for improving of air quality in the region.



6. Prevention, control and abatement of air pollution– Steps taken, proposals, research and other measures undertaken in 2023-24

6.1 Abatement of Industrial Pollution

Commission since its inception prioritized the task of shifting industrial operations including others sector/applications in Delhi - NCR from coal and other polluting fossil fuels to cleaner approved fuels. The standard approved fuel list for entire NCR was further upgraded during 2023-24 through an addendum on 03.04.2023 (available on CAQM website at https://caqm.nic.in.)

Up to end of 2023-24, out of a total 7759 fuel-based industries identified in entire NCR, 7449 industries were operating on approved fuels. While all the industries in Delhi shifted completely to approved fuels, 310 industries in other areas in NCR which could not shift to approved fuels were either closed down by themselves or through the closure directives issued from concerned SPCB/DPCC. The concerned SPCBs in NCR and DPCC were further directed to ensure strict vigilance on use of only approved fuels in the industrial units and also towards adoption of appropriate air pollution control measures and adherence to the prescribed standards of emissions in respective units.

Inspection of Industries - Monitoring & Enforcement of Directions in DelhiNCR

The Commission lays due focus on monitoring and enforcement of various directions and standards prescribed for industries. DPCC / NCR state PCBs were directed for conducting regular audit / inspections towards effective implementation/enforcement of environmental norms/rules/regulations etc. in industrial sector. The status of inspections carried out during 2023-24 is as under:

PNG Infrastructure in Delhi-NCR towards transition to cleaner fuels


Towards faster adoption of PNG in industrial applications across NCR, in close coordination with all stakeholders viz. MoPNG, City Gas Distribution Agencies (CGDs) in NCR, industrial associations and SPCB/ DPCC, 217 industrial areas in entire NCR out of a total 240 industrial areas were equipped with PNG infrastructure/connectivity till the end of 2024. The PNG infrastructure/connectivity in remaining 23 areas (5 areas in Uttar Pradesh, 12 areas in Haryana and 6 areas in Rajasthan) is also likely by the end of 2024.

Co-firing of Biomass in Thermal Power Plants

Paddy stubble burning in the states of Haryana, Punjab and NCR areas in Uttar Pradesh becomes a matter of serious concern during the winter months particularly when the meteorological conditions are already unfavorable for the general air quality in Delhi-NCR. With a view to abate stubble burning and air pollution owing to stubble/biomass burning and in line with the policy of Ministry of Power for co-firing of minimum 5% biomass Thermal Power Plants (TPPs), the Commission had earlier issued statutory Direction No.-42 dated 17.09.2021 mandating 5-10% co-firing of biomass/biomass based pellets replacing coal in 11 identified Thermal Power Plants (TPPs) located within 300 Km of Delhi as a step towards augmenting efficiency of ex-situ management of stubble/biomass generated in NCR areas and in the states of Haryana and Punjab. Further, The Commission also issued an Advisory No.11 dated 30.08.2023 to all the NCR States and TPPs concerned for Co-firing of Bio-mass (focusing on paddy straw-based pellets) in Thermal Power Plants.



The compliance in this context is periodically reviewed and monitored through regular review meetings in CAQM in coordination with MoP/SAMARTH and identified TPPs. This was vigorously followed up and at the end of 2023-24, total quantity of Biomass co-fired by these 11 power plants stood at about 2.58 Lakh MT, of which about 1.45 lakh MT biomass was co-fired in the last three months i.e. Jan to March, 2024. This boost in co-firing is expected to be sustained and further augmented in 2024-25.







6.2 Abatement of Air Pollution from Diesel Generator Sets

Uncontrolled use of Diesel Generator (DG) sets is a major contributing factor for deterioration of air quality in the entire National Capital Region.

In wake of prevailing adverse air quality in NCR, while generally banning the use of DG sets in NCR during the restrictions under the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) till 2022, the Commission permitted use of DG sets for certain emergency purposes/services, even under the period of ban imposed under the GRAP.

Emission control Devices / systems in DG sets and running of DG sets in a dual fuel mode was accordingly taken up as a priority action by the Commission, besides encouraging all stakeholders to switch to purely gasbased systems or procure new DG sets to latest and stringent emission standards.

The Commission, from time to time, accordingly issued Directions for regulated operations of DG sets in Delhi and NCR based on the progress with respect to availability of certified agencies for retro-fitment of ECDs and for retro-fitment of dual fuel kits (Diesel and Gas) in the existing DG Sets operating in NCR.

A comprehensive Direction No. 76 was issued on 29.09.2023, in supersession/modification of all extant directions, stipulating adoption of the Schedule as detailed out in the said Direction for regulated operations of DG sets (only as a backup against regular power supply failures) across all sectors in the NCR including Industrial, Commercial, Residential and Office establishments etc w.e.f. 01.10.2023.

Direction No. 76 dated 29.09.2023 as amended on 22.02.2024

Stipulating adoption of the revised Schedule for regulated operations of DG sets (only as a backup against regular power supply failures) across all sectors in the NCR including Industrial, Commercial, Residential and Of ice establishments etc. w.e.f. 01.10.2023



DG sets catering to emergency services were however given time upto 31.12.2023 to ensure compliance of said Direction No. 76 dated 29.09.023. Power generating sets running purely on natural gas/cleaner fuels are out of the regulatory regime and can be run uninterruptedly as and when required. However, DG sets of capacity more than 800 KW were permitted for all applications in the NCR, subject to compliance of the "in-use" emissions standards prescribed for this category under Direction No.76.

Follow up with manufacturers and suppliers of ECDs/dual fuel kits for DG Sets

Regular follow up meetings were held with manufacturers and suppliers of ECDs/dual fuel kits for DG Sets. Certified RECDs are now available for DG Sets of capacity range of 61 KW to 800 KW. The list of certified RECDs with applicable capacity range of DG Set was also made available on the website of CPCB along with details of the manufacturers of RECD including the certifying agencies.

The status of compliance of Direction No. 76 regarding regulated use of DG sets are monitored by the Enforcement Task Force (ETF) of the Commission. Total 2849 DG Sets in 1438 installations across NCR were inspected. Out of 1438 units, DG sets installed in 300 units (777 DG Sets) were found to be compliant with the Directions. Show Cause Notices were also issued against 836 units whereas sealing orders were issued against 302 units.



6.3 Management of Dust from C&D activities

The Commission regularly followed up for effective compliance/ enforcement of its earlier statutory directions for remote monitoring of bigger C & D projects through a dedicated web-portal and also the advisories, orders and directions related to dust mitigation measures viz. use of adequate numbers of anti-smog guns, dust screens, wind breakers etc. and water sprinkling etc. Grossly violating construction sites were also issued closure directions.

In furtherance to exercise effective control on dust mitigation measures from construction projects, the Commission issued an Advisory dated 06.04.2023 followed by Direction No. 79 dated 13.02.2024 to all agencies issuing completion certificates or occupancy certificates against C&D projects, to issue such certificates only after ensuring that no closure direction issued by the Commission is pending against such entities.

An Advisory dated 14.02.2024 was also issued to the ULBs and project monitoring agencies to incorporate measures towards abatement of dust in the respective permissions/sanctions, including in the conditions of contracts/agreements.

Statutory Direction & Advisory

Advisory No. 8 dated 06.04.2023 and further Direction No. 79 dated 13.02.2024 - Statutory Direction has been issued by the Commission to all agencies issuing completion certificates/ occupancy certificates against C&D projects, to issue such certificates only after ensuring that no closure direction issued by the Commission is pending against such entities.

Advisory No. 12 dated 14.02.2024 has been issued to ULBs and project monitoring agencies to incorporate measures towards abatement of dust in the respective permissions/sanctions, including in the conditions of contracts/agreements.



Smaller C&D projects having plot size < 500 m² which are not mandated to be registered on the web portal were also inspected and monitored to ensure that all prescribed measures towards dust suppression and mitigation are scrupulously implemented and followed on such construction projects. For all category of C&D Projects, concerted inspection drives are being carried out followed by deterrent punitive actions against grossly violating C&D sites including imposition and realization of appropriate environment compensation charges and closures, if warranted.

6.4 Management of Dust from Roads and Open Areas

Towards abatement of air pollution from roads, central verges, roadsides and open areas along the right of ways, which perennially is one of the most prominent sources of particulate matter emissions in entire NCR leading to adverse AQI, the Commission had earlier issued Direction to all the road owning agencies in the NCR to set up dedicated Dust Control and Management Cells (DCMCs). The Nodal officers, of the 62 DCMCs so constituted in entire Delhi-NCR, are responsible for close monitoring and necessary actions for the abatement of dust from roads, central verges, pathways/ side-walks and open areas by means of deployment of adequate numbers of anti-smog guns particularly in road construction projects, optimum utilization of road sweeping machines and scientific disposal of dust collected, regular sprinkling of water on roads/Row to suppress dust, augmentation of capacity of mechanized sweeping/water sprinkling, use of dust suppressants and properly maintained pot-hole free roads to alleviate dust re-suspension. Furthermore, the DCMCs have also been tasked with a critical activity to saturate greening of all central verges / road medians and green / pave the walkways, pathways and open areas along the right of ways through appropriate grassing techniques, permeable paver blocks, plantation of shrubs and trees etc.

Regular review meetings with the nodal officers of the "Dust Control Management Cells" in NCR and other concerned agencies have been convened by the Commission during the year for dust mitigation measures and monitoring of the key parameters.

Advisory

Road dust being a significant source to air pollution and posing a serious threat to poor air quality and associated health hazards, the Commission issued an Advisory No. 13 dated 14th February, 2024 to all Nodal agencies of DCMCs in Delhi and NCR regions of U.P., Haryana and Rajasthan to also ensure that all tender notices contract documents, agreements etc. for the road construction / maintenance works incorporate all guidelines and safeguards entrusted upon the DCMCs, including stipulating quality benchmarks, conducting regular site inspections and appropriate penal provisions and measures for non-compliances for mitigation of dust from roads, pathways and open areas along ROW.

6.5 Abatement of Air Pollution from Vehicular Sector

Vehicular pollution from a staggering total population of vehicles plying in Delhi-NCR, including large number of floating vehicles into this region is another prominent source of PM2.5 / PM10 emissions besides other gaseous emissions like NOx, CO etc. and accordingly has been one of the key focus areas for the Commission. The Commission conducted regular progress meetings with all agencies concerned in Delhi and NCR States for the actions envisaged in the various directions of the Commission and the targeted timelines for specific actions as per the comprehensive policy of the Commission for abatement of air pollution in Delhi-NCR.

Compliance of regulatory requirements


The PUC (Pollution Under Control) certificate regime is a means of compliance to the prescribed emission standards for various categories of vehicles. The Commission through the Transport departments of GNCTD, NCR State Governments, Traffic Police and Municipal Corporations of the respective NCR States directed for regular drives to check the compliance of PUC norms and to initiate strict actions against vehicles not having a valid PUC, visibly polluting vehicles, over-loaded vehicles and uncovered vehicles carrying C&D materials etc. The details of the special drives conducted for PUC violation, visibly polluting / over loaded vehicles etc. during 2023-24 in the NCR are as under:

Phasing out of overaged vehicles / end of life vehicles in Delhi and NCR

All diesel fueled vehicles which are more than 10-year old and all petrol vehicles more than 15-year old are not permitted to plying in the entire NCR as per the extant directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and NGT. Such "End of Life" (EOL) vehicles, which are far too polluting owing to much older and relaxed emission norms as compared to the current BS-VI standards, are accordingly required to be phased out from the NCR. Towards compliance of the above, the Commission issued directives to the Transport departments of GNCTD, NCR State Governments, Traffic Police and Municipal Corporations in the respective NCR States to launch drives for liquidating such EOL vehicles and initiate appropriate action for impounding such vehicles found plying on the roads. The status of overaged vehicles impounded in the NCR by concerned agencies is as under:

Vehicle Scrapping Policy:

Delhi and other NCR State Governments have already developed and notified their respective vehicle scrapping policies which are being implemented accordingly. Infrastructure for material recovery and disposal




of end-of-life vehicles has also been set up in the NCR. However, the current rate of scrapping for older vehicles is much lower than the arisings of such vehicles as also the capacities of the Registered Vehicle Scrapping Facilities (RVSF) set up in NCR.

Haryana, UP and Rajasthan presently have set up 10, 09 and 02 Registered Vehicle Scrapping Facilities (RVSF) respectively. However, Delhi presently just has 4 automated vehicles testing facilities and shares the RVSF of neighboring cities for scrapping of such Delhi registered EOL vehicles.

Promotion of EVs in Delhi and NCR

Towards an effective long-term strategy of controlling vehicular emissions, transition to e-mobility has been identified as an important tool by the Commission and requisite infrastructure to support e-mobility i.e., battery charging stations, battery swapping points and facilities for disposal of large volume of scrapped batteries etc. is also required to match pace with the transition to E mobility in the ensuing years. The growth in registration of Electric vehicles in Delhi and NCR during 2023-24 over the year 2022-23 as reported by the State Govts. / GNCT of Delhi is as under:





EV charging infrastructure in the NCR has also undergone augmentation. There are a total 3,100 battery charging stations (with 4,793 charging points) in place in the NCT of Delhi whereas 488 charging stations have been set up in other areas in NCR till end of 2023-24.



Moving towards Cleaner Public Transportation in NCR

Augmentation of clean City Public Bus Services

To provide affordable, clean and comfortable public transport and decongest city roads thereby reducing vehicular pollution through reduced use of personal vehicles, action is ongoing for augmentation of city public bus service through CNG/E-buses in NCR, broadly as per the model yardsticks and service level benchmark of MoHUA (based on population density) in GNCTD and the respective NCR States Governments.

The GNCT of Delhi plans to expedite procurement of Low Floor Ebuses. At the end of 2023-24, total size of the bus fleet for public transport system in Delhi is 7,389 which includes 1,300 E-buses.

State Government of Haryana has launched a special purpose vehicle under Haryana City Bus Service Ltd. for providing city bus services in 9 cities of Haryana including Sonipat, Rewari, Karnal and Rohtak in NCR districts of Haryana. 50 E-buses are planned to be procured for each city under the PM E-Bus Sewa scheme of MoHUA. Presently, city bus services are operational in Gurugram and Faridabad with 50 and 150 CNG buses respectively in these 02 cities.



For the NCR areas of Uttar Pradesh, as of now 50 E-buses are operational in Ghaziabad. As per MoHUA yardstick, 410, 490, 220 buses are required for Ghaziabad, Meerut, Noida & Gr. Noida cities respectively. Out of these, 150, 100 & 100 e-buses are planned to be procured for Ghaziabad, Noida & Gr. Noida and Meerut cities respectively by Department of Urban Transport under PM E-Bus Sewa Scheme.

Statutory Direction No. 78 dated 19.10.2023

Migration of inter-city bus services to Delhi-NCR to cleaner modes

Towards a cleaner intercity commute, the Commission issued Direction No. 78 dated 19.10.2023 to Transport Departments of Haryana, Rajasthan and UP for transition of all State Transport Public intercity bus services from any city / town in these states to Delhi only through EV/CNG/BS-VI Diesel mode w.e.f 01.11.2023. The said Directions also call for faster transition to such cleaner intercity bus services from anywhere in these states to any city / town in NCR.

In the next phase, the States of Punjab, Himanchal Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Madhya Pradesh and the UT of J&K have also been directed to submit action plans for transition of the older polluting buses (BS III/ IV) from these states to any city of Delhi-NCR only to cleaner modes (EV/CNG/BS-VI Diesel). Till the end of 2023-24, about 50% buses (498 out of 1006 buses) operating to Delhi from various parts of these States have already transitioned to EV/CNG/BS-VI Diesel mode.

6.6 Abatement of Air Pollution from Crop Residue Burning


The Commission after due deliberation with concerned stakeholders issued a detailed and comprehensive framework in June, 2021 for effective prevention and control of stubble burning. Based on the said framework action plans for prevention and control of the paddy stubble burning incidents were formulated on a year-to-year basis and implemented by State Governments of Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh (for NCR districts), Rajasthan (for NCR districts) and GNCTD, for the years 2021, 2022 and 2023 respectively.



Incidences of Paddy Residue Burning in 2023

As per the Standard ISRO Protocol, arising out of the implementation of the action plans as prepared and updated during 2021, 2022 and 2023, a gradual but significant reduction has been recorded in the number of paddy residue burning events. For the period from 15th September, 2023 to 30th November, 2023, a total of 39,186 paddy residue burning events were reported in Punjab, Haryana, Delhi and NCR districts of Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan, which was 27% less compared to the incidences for the corresponding period during 2022, as tabulated under:

Towards advance planning/preparedness for Paddy harvesting season, 2024, the Commission started following up with the concerned State Governments, well before the paddy sowing season 2024, as early as



in February, 2024 to sensitize the respective State machinery for prevention and control of the incidents of stubble burning to target total elimination of paddy farm fires during 2024.

Based on the framework advised by the Commission and learnings from the year 2021-2023, updated action plans were called for from the State Governments of Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh for the year 2024.

The respective action plans as submitted were deliberated upon in the full-Commission meeting held on 15.03.2024 and finalized.



The State Governments of Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh have been advised to effectively implement the respective revised action plans, in letter and spirit, to ensure complete elimination of paddy stubble burning during 2024, inter-alia focusing on the following:

- Complete mapping of the identified means of management of paddy stubble (in-situ management through CRM machinery, Biodecomposer application etc., ex-situ management as fuel/feedstock) to cover all farms/farmers in the State.
- ii. Review of availability and allocation of machines in CHCs/FPOs/Farmbanksetc.
- iii. Augmentation of the number of CHCs and ensuring availability of appropriate resources with them.
- iv. Ensuring procurement of all identified new CRM machines by individuals/CHCs for the year 2024, well in advance, by July-August 2024.



- v. Optimise and enhance utilization of machinery available with CHCs/FPOs/Farm Banks etc., focusing on supply of such machines to poor and marginal farmers.
- vi. IT/Web based monitoring mechanism to be instituted for utilization of machines in CHCs/FPOs/Farm Banks etc, in addition to surveillance by Village/Block level teams/officers.
- vii. Continuation and enhancement of IEC/Sensitisation activities to create awareness regarding the ill effects of stubble burning.
- viii. Timely appointment and deputation of Nodal/Cluster/Village level officers for strict surveillance and enforcement actions.
- ix. Mechanism for pin-pointing and inspection of the farms/areas where paddy straw is burnt, if any, as per standard ISRO protocol and ensuring red-entries/accountability in such farm records, including levying and realization of prescribed EC.
- x. Conducting frequent reviews and close monitoring of implementation of the framework/state specific plan of action at various levels in the State Government/District Administration.

GNCT of Delhi and State Government of Rajasthan have also been advised to make every effort towards totally eliminating paddy stubble burning incidents during the ensuing harvest season.

The MoEFCC, vide notification No. G.S.R. 322 (E) dated 28th April, 2023 also notified the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas (Imposition, Collection and Utilization of Environmental Compensation for Stubble Burning) Rules, 2023 towards effective enforcement and penal measures in respect of paddy stubble burning.

6.7 Abating pollution by burning of Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) and miscellaneous waste

The Commission in its comprehensive policy to curb air pollution in National Capital region issued in July, 2022, identified MSW management and burning of open waste as one of the major sources of air pollution and accordingly advised various departments/authorities concerned to develop and monitor appropriate plans to manage the waste generated in the region. The Departments concerned in the GNCTD were advised to guide, facilitate, monitor, resolve and periodically review the status of this critical aspect of municipal solid waste management in Delhi with ULBs and agencies concerned.

Guarding against fire incidents at Landfill Sites and in open areas

The action plans for respective states in NCR call for control of Bio-mass/ Municipal Solid Waste Burning and fires in Landfill Sites, focusing on deployment of enforcement teams, quick complaint redressal and corrective actions through IT enabled platforms. There has been a drastic reduction in the number of incidences of fires in sanitary landfill sites in Delhi as compared to past years.

Management of Municipal Solid Waste

In Delhi, 11,347 TPD of municipal solid waste is generated daily under MCD, NDMC and DCB jurisdiction, majorly in MCD jurisdiction around 11,000 TPD. The entire MSW generated in NDMC (285 TPD) and DCB (62 TPD) jurisdictions is processed in the Waste to Energy (WtE) plant located at Okhla. In the MCD jurisdiction, however, presently only about 73% of the total MSW generated viz. 8073 TPD is diverted for processing in



the WtE plants at Okhla, Ghazipur, Tehkhand, Bawana including other means of management viz. compost pits, Organic Waste Convertor and recycling through Material Recovery Facilities, with an overall waste processing efficiency of about 90% (i.e. 7200 TPD).

Towards augmenting the capacities to handle the entire MSW generated in Delhi, the MCD have prepared a plan / roadmap for setting up of new infrastructure / augmentation of existing facilities mainly in the form of WtE plants, for a cumulative additional capacity to the tune of about 7000 TPD. Once these facilities are commissioned, the total capacity to process the MSW would outweigh the daily generation of MSW in the entire NCT of Delhi. The MCD envisages a total MSW handling capacity of about 15,500 TPD of MSW by 2027, which would be surplus to the overall generation of MSW in Delhi and is also likely to sustain the incremental MSW load for next 10 years


Liquidating Legacy Municipal Solid Waste

Of a cumulative total 280 Lakh MT of legacy waste at the three dump sites in Delhi i.e. Ghazipur, Bhalswa and Okhla (quantity assessed as in July, 2019), around 133 Lakh MT has been bio-mined.

6.8 Abatement of Air Pollution from Dispersed Sources

The project on abatement of Air Pollution from Dispersed Sources is ongoing in Delhi since, 2022 which aims to capture surveys, complaints etc. related to air polluting activities from various dispersed / misc. sources through a dedicated web-portal. The issues so flagged are then assigned to the concerned agencies for appropriate resolution of the same and the status post resolution / attention to the issue is uploaded back on the portal. The implementation of the project was regularly reviewed by the Commission during the year. A total of 2,03,169 issues have been identified so far, of which 1,66,452 issues (approx. 81.9%) have since been resolved.





The programme has also been further extended to **Noida**, **Ghaziabad and Gurugram cities in NCR** where the current level of pendency has been reported to be 60%, 80% and 97% respectively and all out efforts are being made to resolve the issues on priority in coordination with the ULBs concerned.

6.9 Greening and Plantation in NCR to Abate Air Pollution


To abate air pollution and to prevent desertification, dust intrusion, and cleansing of the harmful gases, dust mitigation measures are essential through greening and plantations on roadsides, open areas including establishment of forest sinks in urban spaces etc. In this direction, the Commission since beginning of 2023-24 started to engage with the NCR States and GNCTD as well as identified Central government agencies, higher educational and research institutions etc. to improve green cover in Delhi NCR. These agencies were asked to develop target-oriented action plans for mass plantation drives, also focusing on protecting and improving the plants increasing their survival rate, greening and paving central verges and sidewalks throughout the NCR road network.

The preparation and implementation of action plans for broadening the "Nagar Van" and "Nagar Vatika" net in NCR cities and urban agglomerations, including the adoption of the Miyawaki technique for dense plantation in constrained urban spaces, was a particular point of emphasis for all ULBs in the region. The Commission regularly interacted with a range of stakeholders, placing particular emphasis on the participation of citizens and students in plantation initiatives as part of its efforts to increase the amount of green space in the Delhi-NCR and reduce air pollution. The Commission periodically assessed the progress made towards the goals specified in the respective action plans. The following accomplishments were recorded by the governments of Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, and GNCTD in 2023–2024 (including NHAI) in relation to their respective targets:



The Commission concentrated on land areas in Delhi-NCR which were suitable for increasing the amount of green cover. This included determining the areas suitable for dense plantations, native species for various locations, making sure that free saplings distributed by State Forest Departments were taken care of after planting and appointing nodal officers to oversee and coordinate plantation operations.



In addition, plantation targets were also set for some important Central agencies like para military forces, DMRC, KVS etc, as well as higher educational research institute in NCR region. These agencies also surpassed their targets as depicted in the pictograph below:





Dense Plantation through Miyawaki Technique

The Miyawaki Technique, which creates dense plantations to reduce air pollution, has been vigorously advocated by the Commission. With this technology, plant growth rates are expected to be ten times faster and plantation densities thirty times higher than with traditional techniques. Regardless of soil type or climate, the Miyawaki Method is a novel and inventive approach based on the Potential Natural Vegetation concept that has been shown to be effective worldwide. Utilizing native flora from the area, this method is 100% organic and helps the local ecosystem. The benefits of Miyawaki forests include increased urban biodiversity, reduced heat island effects, carbon sequestration, and support for climate change mitigation.

During 2023-24, the Miyawaki plantation were taken at different place by various agencies including Municipal Corporation of Delhi, Ghaziabad Municipal Corporation, New Okhla Industrial Development Authority (NOIDA). The major Miyawaki plantation done during 2023-24 is a under:



6.10 Research and Development Initiatives

The Commission sanctioned and granted financial assistance for 07 projects for "Research and Development" in the field of abatement of air pollution during 2022-23. Amongst these, 01 project entitled "Trial of Ambient Air Purification System at Anand Vihar, ISBT, Delhi" executed under the supervision of Principal investigator, Dr. K.S. Rajan, Professor, Dept. of Chemical Engg. SASTRA Deemed University; Thanjavur has been completed during the year 2023-24. The field demonstration study report concluded that an average 30 % reduction in PM2.5 and 25% reduction in PM10 respectively was achieved at platform "A" of the Anand Vihar ISBT, Delhi during the study period September, 2023 to March, 2024.

6.11 Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP)

The Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) envisages a series of specific preventive/restrictive emergency measures to be initiated/implemented by identified authorities across the NCR depending on the severity of air pollution, particularly during the critical winter months, to minimize impacts.



The GRAP schedule for NCR was comprehensively reviewed and revised in 2023. The revised schedule of the GRAP was issued in accordance with Direction No. 77 dated October 6, 2023.



Statutory Directions

Invocation/Revocation of Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) during 2023-2024

The Sub-Committee on GRAP held 30 meetings from time to time during the year and invoked/revoked measures in the various phases of GRAP based on the prevailing air quality and AQI forecasts. GRAP Stage-I was in effect for approximately 144 days during this period, GRAP Stage-II for 121 days, GRAP Stage-III for 39 days, and GRAP Level IV was in effect for 13 days.



6.12 Enforcement Task Force - Flying Squads for incognito inspections

The Commission constituted Enforcement Task Force (ETF) on 02.12.2021 (re-constituted on 17.05.2024) in exercise of the powers conferred under section 11(5) of the CAQM Act, 2021 as well as the enabling provisions made thereunder. It monitors and supervises the implementation of the statutory directions issued by the Commission from time to time and related environmental statutes.

40 Flying Squads/Inspections Teams have been constituted by the Commission to carry out incognito checks for identifying serious violations/statutory Directions of the Commission and recommend appropriate action thereon, based on the seriousness of non-compliances. The ETF, through its regular meetings, considers the recommendations of the Flying Squads/Inspection Teams and recommend appropriate directions on each of the inspection reports, including reviewing the status of various Closure Directions and Resumption Orders issued by the Commission.

Up to 31.03.2024, Flying Squads inspected a total of 17,411 sites out of which 573 Industrial premises, 297 C&D sites and 41 entities using DG sets were found to be grossly violating/non-compliant with respect to various statutory directions, guidelines and orders. Accordingly, closure directions were issued in respect of such 911 units. 838 such units were later permitted to resume operations by the Commission following due corrective and preventive measures by such units to address the gross violations and with a commitment to henceforth comply with all statutory directions/guidelines of the Commission and other related statutes to abate air pollution.

Besides, Industrial units and construction/ Demolition project sites, particularly to ascertain the compliance of emission control mechanism in DG sets in use in large number across all sectors, upto 31.03.2024, a total of 1546 units (3037 DG sets) had also been inspected by the Flying Squads for non-compliant DG sets. Of these, 321 units (485 DG sets) were found noncompliant with respect to the Commission's Direction No. 76 and were issued sealing orders. Concerned SPCBs/DPCC were directed to de-seal the DG sets after ensuring compliance of the Commission's Direction.



7. Establishment, Finance and Budget

Establishment

During 2023-24, the Commission was headed by the Chairperson Dr. M.M. Kutty, also comprising of three full-time Technical Members namely Dr. N.P. Shukla, Dr. S.D. Attri and Dr. Virinder Sharma, Shri Arvind Nautiyal, Member Secretary, in addition to ex-officio Members, Members from NGOs and other Members, as provided in the Act.

The Commission operates from its office premises at 17th Floor, Jawahar Vyapar Bhawan, (STC Building), Tolstoy Marg, New Delhi – 110001, and functions through the officers and staff posted by the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, on deputation as well as through contractual / outsourced employees. The Government of India sanctioned 56 posts for the Commission across various cadres, in December 2021. Details of such posts and the incumbency position as on 31.03.2024 are as under:

To cater for the deficit, the CAQM has on a need basis appointed contractual manpower/resource persons for managing its roles and functions, within the overall strength sanctioned by the Central Government.

General Administration

The Commission's General Administration Section handles tasks pertaining to the acquisition and upkeep of products and services, as well as tasks involving housekeeping, transportation, sanitation, security and protocol facilities. By giving the necessary support to the Commission's various divisions in accordance with the provisions of the Manual of Office Procedures, General Financial Rules, Delegation of Financial Power Rules, and the Guidelines/Directions periodically issued by the Government of India, the Section enabling the Commission to operate smoothly.

Legal Division

In order to efficiently manage and oversee court cases and other legal affairs, the Commission has a Legal Division. It is in charge of overseeing, coordinating and monitoring legal matters, including providing advice on



tenders and legal matters. The Legal Division handled 14 new cases submitted before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, Hon'ble High Court of Delhi, and Hon'ble National Green Tribunal in 2023–2024 in addition to existing pending legal concerns.

Vigilance

The Vigilance Section caters to vigilance related matters in respect of officers/officials posted in the Commission. The Section is responsible for vigilance activities in the organization under the general guidance of the CVC. The functions of this Section are mainly divided into three parts viz. preventive vigilance, punitive vigilance and surveillance & detection.

"Vigilance Awareness Week" was observed in the CAQM on 30.10.2023, towards spreading awareness during which all officers and staff took an Integrity Pledge.

No complaint involving vigilance angle was received by CAQM against any of its Officers or staff during 2023-24.

Right to Information

An RTI Cell has been established in the Commission to ensure effective and efficient implementation of the Right to Information Act, 2005 and for the purpose of dealing with all matters relating to RTI including appeals, suo-moto disclosures, related reports and returns and coordination in cases of RTI matters. Accordingly, the Commission has designated CPIOs and First Appellate Authority in accordance with the provisions of the Right to Information Act, 2005.

The CAQM received a total of 36 applications under the Right to Information Act 2005 during 2023-24 and provided requisite information against all the 36 RTI applications. A total of 2 appeals were received under the RTI Act which were also disposed of timely.

Official Language

The Commission monitors the use of Hindi in the Official work of the Commission. As envisaged in the Official Language Policy set out by the Department of Official Language, the activities conducted by the CAQM towards promotion of Hindi during the Financial Year 2023-24 include:



- (a) Participation in the meeting of Official Language advisory committee "हिन्दी सलाहकार समिति" of the MoEFCC.
- (b) A fortnightly event "हेन्दी पखवाड़ा" was organized in the Commission during 14th to 29th September, 2023. During this fortnight 05 competitions viz. essay writing, noting and drafting, Hindi calligraphy, Hindi Speech and Hindi poem recitation were organized. The officials of the Commission as well as the contractual/ outsourced employees participated enthusiastically in these competitions.
- (c) 04 Hindi Workshops were organized during the Financial Year 2023-24 to encourage use of Hindi by officials of the Commission.
- (d) Regular meetings of the Official Language Implementation Committee (total 04 meetings) were held in the Commission during the Financial Year 2023-24.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism

The Commission has a Grievance Redressal Mechanism in place that includes a review every two weeks of all outstanding representations and public grievances to ensure prompt resolution. The Commission has implemented a three days a week for public hearings without an appointment so that the public may discuss their issues/ complaints and get them resolved. In order to make it easier for people to report activities in the NCR that cause air pollution, the Commission has also been responding to complaints about air pollution on its social media handle "X."

Media & Outreach

An IEC (Information, Education and Communication) & Media Cell of the Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM) is actively working to expand the reach of the Commission with regard to the various actions taken in coordination with various agencies concerned to abate air pollution in the Delhi-NCR. The Commission's Media Division/Cell released over 34 press releases and briefs in FY 2023–2024 for an extensive coverage in print and digital media.



Additionally, as part of the "Awareness Programmes to Combat Air Pollution from Vehicles in Delhi-NCR" for FY 2023–2024, CAQM actively collaborated with the National Museum of Natural History (NMNH) and, under the direction of the Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change (MoEF&CC), sensitized about 32,337 Delhi–NCR school and college students about actions that they can take as responsible citizens to promote a cleaner, healthier, and more sustainable environment for Delhi-NCR, with a particular emphasis on actions that can be taken to reduce vehicular pollution in the area. The objective of these awareness campaigns, programs, and Nukkad Nataks was to cultivate in the students, a culture of environmental consciousness.

9. Air Quality Perspective for Delhi during 2023


During the year 2023-24 the Commission initiated different measures including its policy based approach, field actions through its advisories & directions/orders etc. in all identified sectors for the abatement of air pollution from Delhi – NCR. Persistent efforts with various stakeholders round the year along with favorable climatic and meteorological conditions helped to improve the air quality in Delhi, which witnessed a significant improvement in the air quality parameters during 2023 as compared to the previous years (barring the periods of very low anthropogenic, industrial and commercial activities during the Covid affected year 2020, owing to complete lockdowns and other restrictions). The Year 2023 has also witnessed the lowest ever recorded daily average values for PM10 and the second based PM2.5 respectively, barring the Covid Year 2020.

Separate Audit Report on the accounts of Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM) for the year 2023-24

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of **Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM)** as on 31st March 2024 and the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19 (2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with section 17(2) of the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

(2) This separate audit report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the law, rules and regulations (propriety and regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc. if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

(3) We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

(4) Based on our audit, we report that:

i. We were obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.

ii. The Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Ministry of Finance. **iii.** In our opinion proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Commission for Air Quality Management in NCR and Adjoining Areas (CAQM) as required under section 17(1) of the Commission for Air Quality Management in National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas Act, 2021 in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

A. Balance Sheet

1. Liabilities

1.1 Current Liabilities and Provisions (Schedule 7): ₹122.39 lakh

1.1.1 Understatement of liabilities

(i) CAQM has not shown an amount of ₹ 5.24 lakh on account of EMD/Bank Guarantee received under 'Schedule 7 Current Liabilities and Provision' line item 'Other Current Liabilities' from various agencies/firms on account of EMD/Security Deposits. This had resulted in understatement of current liabilities and understatement of assets both by ₹ 5.24 lakhs.

B. Income and Expenditure Account

1. Expenditure ₹ 1680.57 lakh

1.1 Establishment Expenses (Schedule-20): ₹ 275.53 lakh

1.1.1 Overstatement of Expenditure

CAQM had made payment of ₹ 8.66 lakh pertaining to 2022-2023 for hiring of Vehicles, Electricity Charges and payment to outsourcing staff etc. in current financial year i.e. 2023-2024. This had resulted in overstatement of Expenditure besides understatement of Prior-period Expenses by ₹ 8.66 lakh.

1.1.2 Understatement of Expenditure

CAQM had made payments of ₹ 20.77 lakh pertaining to period 2023-24 and 2022-23 towards hiring of Vehicles, Electricity Charges and payment to outsourcing staff etc. in the financial year 2024-25. The commission has booked ₹ 14.59 lakh as current liability (others). However, no provisioning for remaining expenses payable during 2023-24 has been made in its account by the commission. This had resulted in understatement of expenditure and current liabilities during 2023-24 both by ₹ 6.18 lakh.

- CAQM has made previous years adjustments in schedule 8 (Fixed Assets) but no disclosures have been made in Notes to Accounts (Schedule-25).
- In Schedule 13 Gants/Subsidies, from Central Govt. ₹ 1629.13 lakh has been shown but the same has not been bifurcated as revenue and capital.

F. Grants-in-aid:



Out of Grants in Aid of ₹1735.93 lakh including rolled over amount of ₹ 104.93 lakh received during the year, the organization could utilize a sum of ₹ 1629.13 lakh leaving a balance of ₹ 106.80 lakh.

- (v) Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Accounts and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- (vi) In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated and other matters mentioned in *Annexure* to this Audit Report give true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.

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Annexure-I

Internal Control System

1. Adequacy of internal audit system

Internal Audit of the commission was required to be conducted by the internal audit wing of Principal Pay & Accounts Office of the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change (MoEF&CC), New Delhi. Internal Audit of CAQM has not been conducted since inception to March 24 by the PAO, MoEF&CC.

2. Adequacy of internal control system

Following deficiencies in relation to internal control system were observed in audit: -

- Certificate regarding the number of pages in the register was not found recorded in any of the registers maintained by CAQM.
- ii. Non-maintenance of Register of Grants: As per rule 234 of GFR 2017, a Register of Grants shall be maintained by the sanctioning authority in the format given in Form GFR - 21. CAQM had released grants amounting to ₹ 115.69 lakh during the period 2023-24 to various Institutions/Organizations, however, no register of grants has been maintained by CAQM.
- The institute is paying huge amounts as legal expenses. Auditors Remuneration or legal fee has been increased exponentially from ₹ 5.35 lakhs (2022-23) to ₹ 16.79 lakhs (2023-24).
- iv. As per uniform format of accounts, indexing of accounts is to be done with proper page marking. The same has not been done by the CAQM. This has been pointed out in previous years also, but no remedial action has been taken.
- v. As per uniform format of accounts, if anything is to be mentioned as 'Others (to be specified)', the same need to be specified. It has been noticed that in schedule 7, Others (sl. No. 2 b) an amount of ₹ 14.59 lakh and (sl. No. 5 b) an amount of ₹ 1.00 lakh, in schedule 11, 'Others' (sl. No. A6) an amount of ₹ 5.16 lakh and (sl. No. B 2d) an amount of ₹ 18.82 lakh and in Schedule 20, (Sl. No. 14) an amount of ₹ 0.41 lakh has been shown. However, the same have not been specified.
- vi. CAQM has shown ₹ 221.04 lakh as Domestic Travel Expenses in Schedule- 20 which is not a Domestic Travel Expenses instead Salaries and Wages (Schedule-20).

3. System of physical verification of fixed assets

1. The physical verification of fixed assets has been conducted for the year 2023-24.



2. Fixed Assets register furnished to Audit was not closed to the year-end as entry of depreciation has not been made in the register and was not certified by the competent authority. This has been pointed out in previous years also, but no remedial action has been taken.

4. System of physical verification of inventory

(a) Physical verification of stock & consumables items has been conducted for the year 2023-24.

(b) Physical verification of library has not been conducted for the year 2023-24.

5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

The commission had no statutory dues outstanding for more than six months from the date of becoming due during 2023-24.

Annexure-A

1. Understatement of liabilities

CAQM did not make any provision for Audit fee payable to the CAG of India for the current year and no balance/figure was reflected in both Schedule-7 'Current Liabilities and Provisions' and Schedule-21 'Other Administrative Expenses' of the accounts. Therefore, liabilities as well as expenditure were understated to that extent. This has been pointed out in previous years also, but no remedial action has been taken.

2. Understatement of Fixed Assets

CAQM has procured books amounting to ₹ 0.07 lakh but the same has not been booked as fixed assets in Schedule-8 (Library Books) which after deduction of depreciation amounting to ₹ 0.03 lakh for the year 2023-24, resulted in understatement of Assets besides overstatement of Expenditure both by ₹0.04 lakh.

3. Discrepancies in previous year's figures in the annual accounts of CAQM

The figures of audited and approved annual accounts of 2022-23 needs to be incorporated by CAQM and shown in the column of previous year in the annual accounts of the year 2023-2024. However, it was noticed during the examination of annual accounts of CAQM that the following figures under various heads of accounts of the year 2022-23 were incorrectly depicted in the current year's accounts:

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SCHEDULE - 24

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.

2. INVESTMENTS

Investments classified as "long term investments" are carried at cost. Provision for decline, other than temporary, is made in carrying cost of such investments. Investments classified as "Current" are carried at lower of cost and fair value. Provision for shortfall on the value of such investments is made for each investment considered individually and not on a global basis. Cost includes acquisition expenses like brokerage, transfer stamps.

3. FIXED ASSETS

Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition inclusive of inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition. In respect of projects involving construction, related pre-operational expenses (including interest on loans for specific project prior to its completion) and from part of the value of the assets capitalized.

Fixed Assets received by way of non-monetary grants, (other than towards the Corpus Fund), are capitalized at values stated, by corresponding credit to Capital Reserve.

4. DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is provided on written down value method as per rates specified in the Income-tax Act, 1961 except depreciation on cost adjustments arising on account of conversion of foreign currency liabilities for acquisition of fixed assets, which is amortized over the residual life of the respective assets.

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In respect of additions to/deductions from fixed assets during the year, depreciation is considered on pro-rata basis.

Assets costing Rs.5, 000/- or less each are fully provided.

5. MISCELLANEOUS EXPENDITURE

Deferred revenue expenditure is written off over a period of 5 years from the year it is incurred.

6. GOVERNMENT GRANTS or SUBSIDIES

Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as Capital Reserve.

Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of the related assets.

Government grants or subsidy are accounted on realization basis.

7. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction.

Current assets, foreign currency loans and current liabilities are converted at the exchange rate prevailing as at the year end and the resultant gain/loss is adjusted to cost of fixed assets, if the foreign currency liability related to fixed assets, and in other cases is considered to revenue.

8. LEASE

Lease rentals are expensed with reference to lease terms.

9. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Liability towards gratuity payable on death/retirement of employees is accrued based on actuarial valuation.

Provision for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the employees is accrued and computed on the assumption that employees are entitled to receive the benefit as at each year end.
